The teachers will be doing benchmark testing in January as well. We will be looking for improvements in the children's development in Math and Reading. The children have been working hard to make the improvements needed to move to the next level.

To maintain the progress made so far this year, we need to make sure our students are doing their homework every night. Please check with your child about their assignments and make sure they are following the expectations of the classroom. Make sure their planners are checked and signed each night.

As we get into winter, flus and colds begin to show their vengeance. If your child has a fever or shows signs of illness, please keep them home. We do not want to infect the rest of the children. When your child returns, make sure you send a note with them.

## **News from First Grade**

The First Grade Team is ready to begin 2019!! We hope you and your families had an enjoyable holiday. Now that we're starting the new year, here are some ideas for New Year resolutions!

Encourage your child to make some learning goals for the new year such as reading daily, memorizing addition facts within 10, and writing (keep a diary or journal at home, write grocery lists, or make birthday cards for friends and family).

Be prepared for the possibility of Artic Academy days. A letter was sent home recently. If you need this information, please contact your teacher.

For Term 2, first graders will be learning place value concepts in Math as well as adding three numbers, and making a ten when adding and subtracting. They will practice counting and writing numbers to 120 also.

For Reading, students will be working on understanding the characters, setting, problem and solution in stories. They will also be practicing how to retell stories with the main idea, key details, and events.

Students will be working on writing opinions this term. Encourage them to share opinions in conversations with you. Ask them to support their opinion with solid reasons. Some ideas for conversations could be to share their favorite book, winter sport or present they received for Christmas. We encourage the students to respect the opinions of others too.

We expect to have a lot of great learning take place for Term 2!

Arctic Academy


